Cherokee National Forest, A History, was the title of our featured speaker Marci Spencer's presentation. It is also the title of her book, published in 2024. She highlighted the Cheroke Type I Interagency Hotshot Crew (IHC) in the northern Unaka Ranger District of the Cherokee National Forest (CNF). In 2021, the IHC celebrated its twentieth anniversary. It is an elite wildland firefighting crew, one of only 110 crews in the nation.

Interesting facts shared about the southern region of the CNF were the 75 native fish in the Conasauga River in the Ocoee District. Biologists claim that it is one of the ten most biologically diverse rivers in the country. Some of its aquatic species exist nowhere else on Earth.

Another interesting story of the Ocoee District was the building of the 1994 Bailey Bridge at the Ocoee Whitewater Center. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers 41st Bridge Company of Fort Campbell, Kentucky, erected the bridge, donated by the Department of Defense. The openweave bridge permitted unobstructed TV camera coverage of the 1996 Olympic slalom races.

Following the banquet of fresh-fried trout and baked chicken, Rick Harris gave an Ode to the 45th Anniversary of the Grand Opening of the BMTA. Rick was filling in for Ken Jones who had heart surgery two days prior to the Annual Meeting. Rick shared the triumph of Clayton Pannell's eight years of dedication and determination to get the BMT to traverse the state of Tennessee. It was the well -oiled machine of Ken Jones, Clayton Pannell, Robert Owenby and Gary Smith, who worked three days a week completing the BMT from Georgia to the Great Smoky Mountains National Park.

Joe Cantwell and Patrick Ward reported 5,749.9 hours of maintenance work with no injuries! Sixty-three members received T-shirts for 30 hours of trail work and 27 members received the coveted 100-Hour Maintainer Club Awards.

Five Hike Leaders received Hike Leader T-shirts, and four hike leaders received the Hike Leader 50-Miler Award for having led 50 plus miles of hikes during the year.

Sixteen T-shirts were awarded to those who volunteer behind the scenes donating their time with financial records, the BMTA Online Store and BMTA's fairly new Wholesale Division, etc. Eight volunteers joined the Volunteer 100-Hour Club as they earned more than 100 hours.

The Benton MacKaye Trail Association (BMTA) hit the trifecta when Steve Hayden, Daphne Martin and Laurie Schatz became one of the regular maintenance teams. At this year's Annual Meeting and Hike Fest Banquet, held in Bryson, North Carolina, November 1, 2025, the three received the Trail Workers of the Year Award.

Each of the "Three Amigos" as they are known has a life-long love of the outdoors. Steve's interest was piqued as a youth when he was in the Scouts. Laurie was inspired to section-hike the entire Appalachian Trail in the state of Pennsylvania. Daphne just plain loves taking an "oxygen bath" anytime/anywhere in the woods.

When Laurie retired and moved to Blue Ridge, GA, she joined BMTA to learn more about the hiking trails in the area. She quickly developed a desire to help keep the BMT in shape and became a regular on BMTA's maintenance trips. Laurie and Daphne met when Daphne was walking on a road near Laurie's house. A strong friendship was born, and they began enjoying the trails together. It was Laurie who introduced Daphne to trail maintenance and Daphne loved it!

Daphne is the driving force behind the productivity of the group. As the lead sawyer, Steve delivers the safety talks. Before beginning to work on the tasks at hand, the team discusses the trees they're cutting, the protocol to be used, the stresses (binds and bends of the tree) that may be encountered as well as the all-important emergency plan.

Steve is certified as a crosscut and chainsaw sawyer. Daphne is certified as a crosscut sawyer while Laurie has earned the titles of Director of Airborne Biomass Relocation and Caption Crash Bang Boom as she throws stuff off the trail. She also enjoys sharing crosscut duties on the other end of the saw from Steve.

Each of them is a Section Maintainer. Steve maintains Sections 5a and 5b (Wilscot Gap >> Brawley Mountain). Laurie and Daphne maintain 10a (Watson Gap >> Jacks River Trail).

While participating in Three Amigos trips, official BMTA work trips and working with other crews, Laurie garnered 332 hours, Daphne 416.5 and Steve 446.5 for a grand total of 1,195 hours!

According to the Three Amigos, the foundation of their success lies in the strong bond between the three of them – each amigo's expertise, enthusiasm for the outdoors and physical skills compliments the talents and abilities of the others.

So, what story lies behind this wonder?



President's Column

The BMTA is proud to announce an exciting milestone in our ongoing effort to secure national recognition and long-term protection for the Benton MacKaye Trail.

On October 21st, the Benton MacKaye National Scenic Trail Feasibility Study Act of 2025 (S. 1376) passed out of the Senate Agriculture, Nutrition and Forestry Committee with unanimous bipartisan support — a critical step forward toward our goal of permanent protection for the BMT.

The bill, sponsored by Senators Raphael Warnock and Thom Tillis (R-NC), and cosponsored by Senators Jon Ossoff (D-GA) and Ted Budd (R-NC), directs the U.S. Forest Service to study the feasibility of designating the BMT as a National Scenic Trail (NST).

An NST designation would benefit the BMTA in many ways — from membership growth and trail awareness to increased technical assistance and community engagement. These opportunities would strengthen our organization and expand public awareness of the BMT.

We did not make this progress alone. For the past three years, we have engaged Monument Advocacy to shepherd us through this process. They have provided valuable guidance and coordination with legislators and federal partners. As we move forward, the BMTA Board will continue to evaluate the benefits of pursuing NST designation, and the support received by Monument Advocacy.

This progress reflects years of dedication and partnership among BMTA volunteers, supporters, and our allies across Georgia, Tennessee, and North Carolina. While this is a huge win, our work is far from over. The bill now moves to the full Senate for consideration. Without a doubt, we are creating Benton MacKaye Trail history!

BMTA to the Len Foote Hike Inn for Half-Price

The beautiful Len Foote Hike Inn has reserved rooms for BMTA members on Monday, February 23, 2026. All rooms will be half-price. Members can call 706-344-1547, Monday through Friday, 8:00 AM-2:30 PM, to make a reservation. Let them know you want a room transferred from Clare Sullivan's name to your name.

The cost for two hikers is \$124.70, which includes dinner and breakfast. One person in a room is \$92.80. These prices include taxes. While there, you can enjoy a history and tour of the inn at 5:00 PM. Following dinner, there will be an interesting, optional presentation. The Inn holds a Platinum Level Leed Certification by the U.S. Green Building Council.





Volunteer of the Year

BMTA's Newsletter Editor, Kathy Williams, was named Volunteer of the Year at BMTA's Annual Meeting Awards Banquet held at Lands Creek Log Cabins in Bryson City, NC, November 1, 2025.

An Army brat, Kathy's family moved a lot. Her father introduced her to horses on her sixth birthday when he took her horseback riding. She later took riding lessons in Germany at a Spanish-style arena lined with mirrors. At MacDill Air Force Base, Kathy remembers riding a horse named Missy. "It wasn't the most pleasant experience since Missy dumped me a lot," said Kathy.

She has fond memories of her job at Tampa General Hospital where she was a Ward Clerk on the Pediatric Floor. She always will treasure the picture taken of her with the famous clown, Emmett Kelly, Jr., when he visited the kids at the hospital.

The allure of horses drew her to begin showing horses – western pleasure, halter and barrel racing. She was comanager of the Silver Dollar Ranch, a Quarter Horse breeding and show operation.

Kathy's next venture in horses was in Fort Smith, AK, where she trained racehorses – she also was a jockey at the track.

When she left the horse world, Kathy went to work for a convenience store, quickly moving up from the midnight shift to become the Southern District Manager. That job enabled her to put her kids through college.

She completed her college degree in International Studies with a minor in Spanish in 2014. Around the same time, she retired to Blue Ridge, GA.
